Gender-based violence is a sin. Preventing and ending violence is the work of everyone, men, women, girls and boys. Together we can be a living witness to our Christian belief that all people are equally made in God's image. We are God's daughters and sons, equally precious, equally loved.

The annual 16 DAYS OF ACTIVISM AGAINST GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE give us an opportunity to pray, break the silence, challenge harmful attitudes and behaviours, and engage women and men in taking action to prevent and end gender-based violence.

The 16 Days of Activism run from 25 November (International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women) to 10 December (International Human Rights Day). Create a Prayer Space




Create a quiet prayer space with resources for prayer and reflection on hand, such as these compiled by:

Run a Workshop



Run a workshop, perhaps for young people, or for men and boys.

Speak out. Make a public statement. Write a letter to a Government Minister. A Church leader can have a powerful impact on people's attitudes and beliefs. Our leadership is important, particularly on public policy issues such as funding and changes in criminal laws.



Build Partnerships



Partner with existing resources if they are in place, including local sexual assault or domestic violence programmes. Organise a collection of useful goods or funds for a local project working with victims and survivors of gender-based violence. Offer meeting space for educational seminars, support groups and survivor networks.

Be a Resource



Prepare to be a resource.

Be in touch with professionals in the fields of sexual assault, dating and domestic violence, stalking, human trafficking, female genital mutilation/cutting, to find out the most pressing issues in your context. Know about referral pathways where they exist.

Be a Safe Space



Ensure those who come into contact with your cathedral or church and its ministry know about your safe church/safeguarding policy and practice.
